Dr. Robert "Bob" T. Robbins

Dr. Robert "Bob" T. Robbins was born February 10th 1940 in Oskaloosa, Kansas to John Donald Sr. and Lois (Johnson) Robbins and passed away in Fayetteville, Arkansas November 26th 2024. He was surrounded by family his last days at the Willard Walker Hospice House, and peacefully passed away with his loving wife at his side.

Dr. Robbins enjoyed a childhood growing up in Oskaloosa on the Johnson Family farm. As a boy he loved to fish and hunt with his friends. He occupied his time recovering from polio building model airplanes. He was a standout student and athlete lettering in 4 sports every year of high school. Robert was awarded a Scholarship at Kansas State University playing football and earning his Bachelor of Science in Biology and Education. He taught high school biology until he went back to Kansas State University to earn his Master's degree in Plant Pathology. Dr. Robbins then continued his education at North Carolina State University earning his PhD in Nematology, starting a lifelong career in that field of study.

In 1973 he was employed by the California Department of Food and Agriculture as a Nematologist. In 1979 he accepted a position as an Associate Professor in Nematology at the University of Arkansas. It was here he became a leading expert in the field of Nematology. He was a fellow of the Society of Nematology and earned the prestigious title of University Professor. Dr. Robbins authored and co-authored over 150 papers on the subject of Nematology, including 33 papers on identifying new species of nematodes. His contributions were felt worldwide with travels to China, Russia, Europe and beyond sharing his knowledge. Dr. Robbins was most proud of the many students that he taught and mentored as they became leaders in the study of Nematology. He retired from the University of Arkansas in 2019 after 40 years of research and teaching and was granted the distinction of Professor Emeritus.

Dr. Robbins' impact went beyond his academic endeavors as he gladly gave his time leading young men in Boy Scout Troop 190 serving as a Scoutmaster for 10 years. He was a patient leader to many scouts encouraging them to "be prepared". He enjoyed his time outdoors camping,

hiking, backpacking, and canoeing. He most loved his time with his scouts on the Buffalo River at Camp Orr. He was so proud of all his scouts, and many of his scouts earned the rank of Eagle, including his two sons.

Robert shared special trips with his wife and family making lifetime memories. He had a special bond with each of his sons and supported them in all that they did. He cherished his four grandchildren and loved them deeply. Robert left behind a legacy of character, love, and family that will never be forgotten.

Dr. Robbins is survived by his wife of 59 years Carolyn Louise Hunt Robbins. His son Brian Robbins (Wendy), grandson Connor and granddaughter Lindsey of Fayetteville, Arkansas; son Dr. Eric Robbins (Holly) and grandsons Luke and Zack of Conway, Arkansas; a beloved nephew George Robbins (Rhonda) of Oskaloosa, Kansas. Sister Emily Mark; niece Sarah Parker and numerous nephews, nieces, and other loving family. He was preceded in death by his parents and brother John Donald Robbins, Jr.

A family service will be held this spring at his nephew's farm Robbins Acres in Oskaloosa. Dr. Robbins was a quiet and modest man and requested no service at this time. Robert requested half his ashes to be spread at the farm and half interred at First United Presbyterian Church Columbarium in Fayetteville, AR.
